The flag of the United States, also called The Stars and Stripes, has 50 stars on the left, one star for every state. A cross shape on a flag frequently symbolizes faith. The flag of Sweden has a yellow cross, representing religious faith. There are also unusual shapes used as a national symbol, such as a leaf. For instance, the flag of Canada features a maple leaf, symbolizing its nation. Now, let's look at pictures of these flags.
